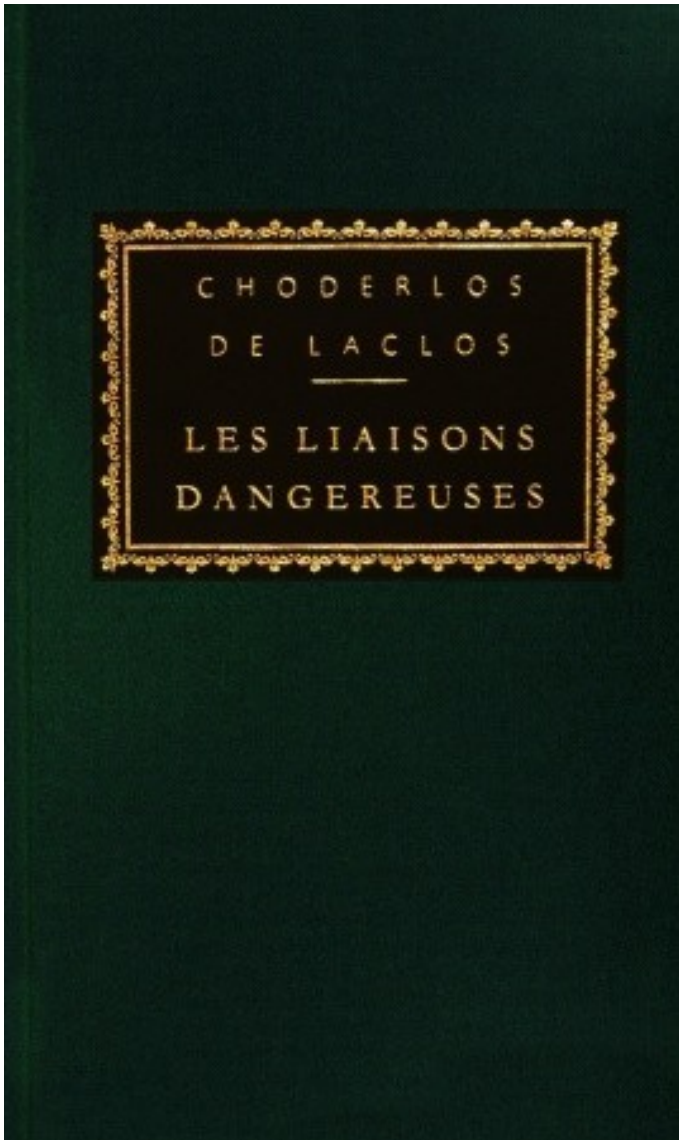

In the two hundred years since its original publication, *Les Liaisons Dangereuses* has provoked, on the one hand, shock and censorship, and on the other, the admiration of readers as different as Marie Antoinette, Andre Gide, and Charles Baudelaire. The story it tells of the intrigues of a pair of sexually carnivorous aristocrats in pre-Revolutionary France has yet to lose a particle of its power to disturb our moral peace.

Rowena: This is one of the most intriguing classics I've read in a long time. At first glance it didn't seem to me as though a book that consists entirely of series of letters written between various people would be interesting, but this was the 18th Century, when letter-writing among the French aristocracy was obviously an art form so each letter is written in beautiful language with such detail and emotion, each with the unique tone of its author.

At the centre of this novel are the main characters, the lothario Vicomte de Valmont, and his former lover the widow Marquise de Merteuil. De Merteuil orders de Valmont to seduce a 15 year old girl, Cecile, who the Marquise's former lover threw her over for, just for her amusement. At the same time, the Vicomte tries his hand at seducing the prudish married Presidente de Tourvel. To Valmont and de Merteuil, it's all a game. As de Valmont says regarding de Tourvel, "I shall possess this woman; I shall steal her from the husband who profanes her: I will even dare ravish her from the God whom she adores. What delight, to be in turns the object and the victor of her remorse! Far be it from me to destroy the prejudices which sway her mind! They will add to my happiness and my triumph. Let her believe in virtue, and sacrifice it to me; let the idea of falling terrify her, without preventing her fall; and may she, shaken by a thousand terrors, forget them, vanquish them only in my arms."

Valmont and de Merteuil are depraved, manipulative and very calculating. The amount of detail that they put into their game is truly astounding. Forget *Iago*, these two are devil incarnates; very Machiavellian. Despite how evil these two are, they are at the same time fascinating. The book did have a *Cruel Intentions* feel to it but it only makes sense that such a book would provide inspiration to Hollywood.

Regine: Whenever Hollywood attempts to do a "modern" adaptation of classic literature by throwing together a caste of up-and-coming teenage heartthrobs, it's usually a fail. *Great Expectations* starring Ethan Hawke and Gwyneth Paltrow: Fail. *Romeo and Juliet* starring Leonardo Dicaprio and Claire Daines: Fail. *O* starring Leelee Sobieski and Josh Hartnett: Let's make that a double Shakespeare Fail.

However, reading [Les Liaisons Dangereuses](#) makes me appreciate the artistry, yes the *artistry* that went into making its 90's teenage counterpart, *Cruel Intentions*. This book sounded so

promising: It's a satire of the moral ambiguity of French aristocracy, a cat and mouse game of seduction, and it contains two of the most scandalous villains in the form of Merteuil and Valmont. My freakin ass.

Merteuil and Valmont were indeed scandalous, but I just got so sick and tired of the repetitive nature of the letters and the naivety of the other characters. By the time that Merteuil and Valmont had ruined everybody, I had stopped caring. This would be a typical letter exchange that would go on in the book:

Danceney: I love you Cecile.

Cecile: I love you Danceney. But I'm not allowed to, so stop writing me.

Danceney: I couldn't possibly. I will die without your love.

Cecile: Okay, keep writing me. I love you so much.

Danceney: I love you too. Proclaim your love for me again. Or else I will die.

Cecile: Okay, I love you. But my mom says I'm not allowed. Looks like you better stop writing me. Again.

Danceney: Never. I love you too much to ever stop writing.

How many times can you say the same thing over and over again? Just read *Dangerous Liaisons* and you will find out.

A few things that saved the book was the erotic sense of humour in the work (at one point, Valmont uses a naked woman as his writing desk), and de Laclos' ability to write unique characters.

Other than that, watching Sarah Michelle Gellar get her just desserts to The Verve is much more entertaining than reading this book. 2 stars.

David Lentz: I think it was Kierkegaard who advised to be aware of entangling alliances. The web of sin in this book is masterfully woven as letters to frame-up an epistolary novel in which each character's letters speak volumes about the characters themselves. The novel was written in the same period as Rousseau in the Napoleonic era, when the novel as a genre was relatively young. Valmont is the penultimate anti-hero and knave who finds decadent pleasure in conquering, as if it were a military campaign, and then abandoning beautiful, prominent women in high society. His cohort the Marquise de Merteuil must be considered one of the great fiends of this new genre, who earns her just rewards. It's fascinating to witness the noose tightening in the exchange of letters among the characters. The dialogue about the nature of love is beautifully articulated in many places, where it is sincere. "And love: does one have it when one wills? Yet one needs it ever." Or "Teach me to live where you are not." So often in this novel love is a high-stakes game played for the perverse joy engendered by the spectacle of the demise of one of the lovers. This is a one of a kind epistolary novel worthy of the acclaim it has received over the centuries for its engaging story line as a morality tale told in the decadent high society of France in the time of Napoleon.

Wendy: Is it simply me, or does one no longer commonly imagine "tense, tightly-plotted mental

drama" while discussing 18th century epistolary novels? And the place am i able to get myself extra of these?!My favourite villains are those I hate to love, and that i quite hate how a lot i admire the Viscomte Valmont and particularly Madame de Merteuil. they're fascinating and devious, they do not provide a crap approximately traditions or conventions, and are so, so very ideal for every other--except, of course, they aren't. Merteuil, in particular, is so glossy in her utter contempt for misogynistic social conventions that she learns to govern them in her favor, and in my favourite letters of hers you'll find how she holds even the rakish Valmont captive and unawares within the palm of her hand. it is delicious. So while the pair of them pass approximately wreaking havoc one of the prudes and ingenues of the French aristocracy (and almost certainly even discovering love), it truly is tough to not get stuck up within the machinations. I delight in how open-ended the writer leaves any interpretation, and, for example, i guess a reader may well decide to purchase one character's ethical flip as earnest or disingenuous, notwithstanding I will not say which manner i am leaning.
